

Outcomes:


Feedback on BuildSmart parent mentoring workshop (14 October 2021)

Most important knowledge learned

- The foundation is very important in everyone's early years.
- Really focusing on loving our children to teach them to have happy hearts before we teach them skills.
- The heart is so important and the connection with the client/caregiver/child can happen so easily and practically.
- Communication is the key between parents and their children.

Application planning

- WOW. I just want to go out as a community worker and share my knowledge with others.
- I will take it back to our farms, ECDs and practitioners. Parent sessions and training.
- I will apply them at my organisation by having children and parents' workshops, the four building blocks (of parenting) are very essential.
- Where I work and live in the community, I will try to apply the skills and knowledge.

COLLABORATIONS

COLLABORATIVE PSYCHO-SOCIAL RESILIENCE PROJECT

In response to the mental health challenges that escalated with the Covid-19 crisis, Ezrah coordinated an innovative psycho-social project in collaboration with Valcare, Sp(i)eel Art Therapies Collective and Good Hope Psychological Service with the following two goals during 2020:

- 1) To offer a story-making tool in an experiential workshop as a means to strengthen individual and group resilience and combat trauma as well as burnout.
- 2) To share theoretical knowledge on resilience and empower ground-workers with knowledge and tools to identify and help families in need of psychosocial support during the COVID-19 crisis.




"Both during the preparation and presentation of these workshops I am touched by the capacity and desire for the human spirit to want to reach out and connect to each other, especially during difficult times.

COLLABORATION ON COUNTERING CHILD TRAFFICKING



PROGRESS

A forum was established between Ezrah, the Department of Social Development, the Western Cape Department of Community Safety and A21 to counter child trafficking in Drakenstein and the wider Western Cape. As a result of forum meetings, the following outcomes were achieved during this time period (September 2021 to November 2021):

- Ezrah drafted the terms of reference to strengthen services in line with the National SOP for Integrated Assistance to Victims of Trafficking. These terms of reference were accepted by the delegates of the forum with the understanding that it may be updated as the work of the forum develops.
- Ezrah led a process to identify training gaps for SAPS related to child trafficking - the Western Cape Department of Community Safety has forwarded these training recommendations to National SAPS.
- The gap analysis that was drafted by Ezrah with input from the Drakenstein Department of Social Development was not only shared with the delegates of the forum, but also with delegates of the Western Cape Department of Social Development.
- A follow-up online meeting was scheduled by the WC Dept. of Social Development for February 2022, where further action plans related to child protection will be discussed.

REFERRAL WORKING GROUP ACTIVITIES

We will continue with working group meetings to draft a referral and communication flowchart to support child victims of exploitation in the Drakenstein-area.

#PARENTTALK SESSION WITH CASE-SA

At our first Drakenstein child protection steering group event on the 22nd of January 2022, the Centre Against Sexual Exploitaition will introduce their #Parenttalk course to assist parents to navigate through the harmful effects of porn on children.



SOCIAL WORKER CASE MANAGEMENT DISCUSSIONS

We are in the process of applying with the SACSSP to obtain CPD points for social workers attending our case management discussions that will be hosted from March 2022 to empower social workers with better child protection case management skills.



COLLABORATIONS

We value our collaborations with the Western Cape Department of Social Development, the Western Cape Department of Community Safety, A21, Sp(i)eel Collective, Valcare, the Thuthuzela Care Centre, Cause for Justice and the National Freedom Network to address child protection challenges.


INVITE TO TAKE HANDS WITH US
